MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The 2025 Annual Report reflects a year of strong performance, continued growth, and meaningful impact across the JCSD Parks & Recreation system.

Serving the Eastvale community with more than 70,000 residents, the Department maintained 15 parks, over 240 acres of parkland, and millions of square feet of landscaped frontage while continuing to deliver high-quality programs, events, and services. From daily maintenance operations to large-scale capital improvements, the focus remained on providing safe, clean, and well-maintained spaces that meet the needs of a growing community.

Programmatically, participation remained strong across all areas. Youth programming, including Kids Zone and camps, served tens of thousands of participants, while sports leagues, enrichment classes, and senior services continued to provide accessible and engaging opportunities for all ages. Signature events such as Picnic in the Park and the summer concert series brought the community together at scale, reinforcing the role parks and recreation play in building connection and community identity.

The Department also saw continued success in innovation and community engagement. The Park Ambassador Program delivered measurable results in its first full year, strengthening communication and responsiveness across the park system. Our Volunteer Program realized contributions exceeding 5,500 hours, further enhancing service delivery and community stewardship.

This year's accomplishments were supported by strong partnerships with local organizations, schools, and community groups, as well as the continued leadership and support of the JCSD Board of Directors. These collaborations remain essential to maximizing resources and expanding the Department's impact.

Recognition at the state level, including awards for programming and overall service delivery, reflects the Department's ongoing commitment to excellence and positions JCSD as a leader in parks and recreation. Looking ahead, priorities remain focused on continued capital investment, program expansion, operational efficiency, and CAPRA reaccreditation. With a clear direction and a strong foundation, the Department is well positioned to build on this momentum and continue delivering high-quality services to the Eastvale community.

WHO WE ARE

The JCSD Parks & Recreation Department has proudly been offering parks & recreation services for the Eastvale community since 2003 and consists of three divisions: 1) Administration; 2) Park/Facility Maintenance and Operations; and 3) Recreation. Collectively, we're responsible for providing recreation programs, activities, and special events; managing over 240 acres of parkland, which includes 15 parks, first-class athletic fields, two splash pads, trails, a 30,000 square foot community center, a 5,000 square foot activity center, and a 2.5-acre special event venue; graffiti abatement; and maintaining nearly 5 million square feet of frontage landscaping.

AWARDS

The National Recreation and Park Association's Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA) provides quality assurance and quality improvement of accredited park and recreation agencies throughout the United States by providing agencies with a management system of best practices. CAPRA is the only national accreditation of park and recreation agencies and is a valuable measure of an agency's overall quality of operation, management, and service to the community. Achieving CAPRA accreditation is the best way to demonstrate that an agency and its staff provide the community they serve with the highest level of service.



In 2015, the JCSD Parks & Recreation Department became one of just five agencies in California to obtain CAPRA Accreditation. Accredited agencies must repeat this process every five years. JCSD was up for reaccreditation in 2020 but requested and received an extension until 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

On September 10, 2021, the CAPRA Commission formally approved JCSD's CAPRA reaccreditation. Impressively, we scored 100% on the assessment by meeting all 154 standards.

Currently, there are only 223 accredited park and recreation agencies in the United States and JCSD is one of only six accredited agencies in California. JCSD will be up for reaccreditation in September 2026.

With 482 Parks & Recreation Programs in the state of California, this means we are in the top 0.8% of California Parks & Recreation Programs!



In 2025, the JCSD Parks & Recreation Department received the CARPD Award of Distinction (Outstanding Program) for the Teen CREW Program! This award honors exceptional planning, development, and execution of recreational programs or events by California park and recreation districts. The Teen CREW Program is a dynamic youth leadership initiative based at the Desi House, designed to empower students in grades 7–12 with the skills, confidence, and real-world experience needed to become engaged, civic-minded leaders. Rooted in the values of Community, Responsibility, Enrichment, and Work Ethic (CREW), the program meets on the third Thursday of each month and offers workshops, team-building activities, and volunteer opportunities focused on leadership, career development, and service. Through partnerships with local leaders and professionals, students gain mentorship and career insights. With active participation from 30 – 40 students across local schools, Teen CREW is helping shape the next generation of leaders while fostering a stronger, more connected Eastvale community.

In 2025, the JCSD Parks & Recreation Department received special recognition from the California State Assembly. The Department was recognized as one of California's leading Parks & Recreation providers. "Through their vision and leadership, JCSD has become a model for public agencies throughout California," said Assemblymember Castillo. "Their dedication to enhancing quality of life through parks and programming continues to make a meaningful impact in Eastvale and beyond."

DEER CREEK PARK FURNITURE REPLACEMENT

This project consisted of purchasing and installing all new picnic tables, benches, trash receptacles, and drinking fountains within the park.

This project consisted of the resurfacing of two half-court basketball courts.

This project consisted of converting 2 tennis courts into 8 pickleball courts.

This project consisted of the resurfacing of one half-court basketball court.

This project consisted of interior and exterior painting, new flooring, countertops and window coverings, and a new roof.

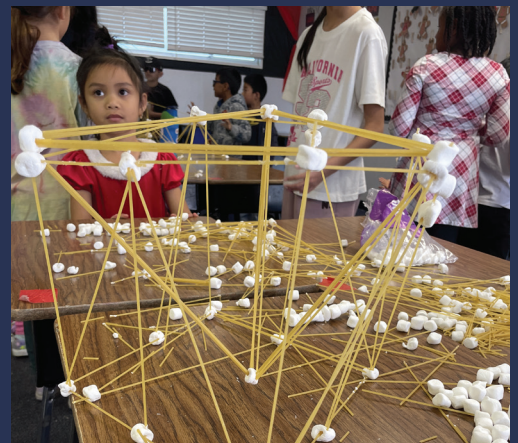

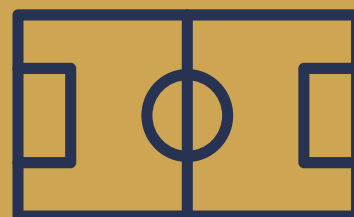

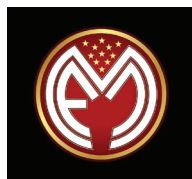
FULL TIME MOST VALUABLE PLAYER AWARD

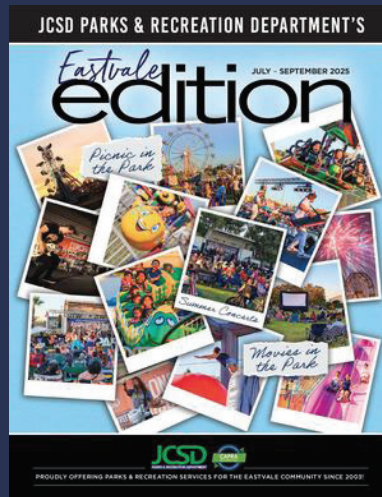
